

## LANGENLOIS | Kamptal DAC | Grüner Veltliner

ORIGIN: LANGENLOIS is the centre of the Kamptal appellation and widely known as the epitome of wine culture. The rolling hills that surround the historic wine-growing town have always made valuable contributions to the regional viticulture. Loess—Alpine calcareous soil deposited over hundred thousands of years—serves to the typical character of these wines.

CHARACTER: LANGENLOIS represents the lower situated aspects of the Kamp-valley (Kamptal) appellation. Grapes ripen to full maturity here and lead to wines with a little more spiciness and broader shoulders. The wines of the lower Kamptal are characterized by the unmistakable typicity of the region paired with a little more seriousness. In addition to the delicate fruit aromas, the wines are characterized by that little extra spiciness, a balanced body with power, but also elegance. These wines are perfect food companions and quite universal in food matching.

WINE LIST DESCRIPTION: LANGENLOIS is representing the typical village character of the Austrian KAMPTAL appellation. It stands for a balanced richness and rounded intensity, fine fruit and a zesty spiciness and is a universal food match.
